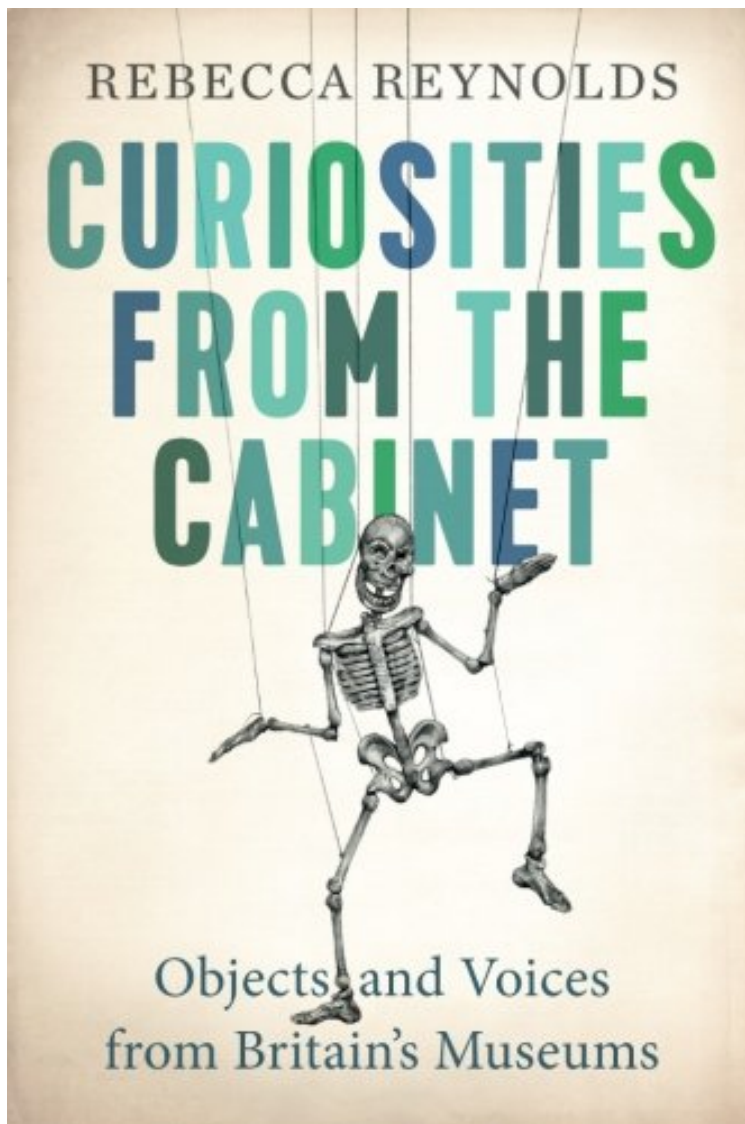

This book really is a cabinet of curiosities in words. Not only does it bring alive some of the wonderful objects kept in museums, it brilliantly illuminates what goes

on "behind the scenes" to bring these objects to the public eye. This is no dull list of dusty descriptions. No literary gallery feet here. The objects are cleverly grouped by category, and each object is neatly described. This description will include the words of a person connected with the object in some way. These interviews add a human element to the book and serve to bring the objects to life in a way that would be impossible with a mere description of what they look like. The objects chosen are highly diverse and range from ancient archeology to a living colony of leaf cutter ants. This fascinating diversity really adds to the book's appeal. Many times during the read I found myself inspired to hit the internet to find more information about Brantly helicopters or south American insects. The book as a whole telescopes a great deal of careful and thoughtful research into a highly readable and accessible volume. Curiosities from the Cabinet presents objects found in UK museums from Weston-super-Mare to the Shetlands, plus interviews with people who know and love them curators, conservators, artists, visitors, users. We hear about a euthanasia machine used by four people (introduced by the doctor who developed it); a colony of ants; the world's oldest usable map; some 1920s toilet paper and many other exhibits. This book will inform and intrigue anyone who likes visiting museums.
