

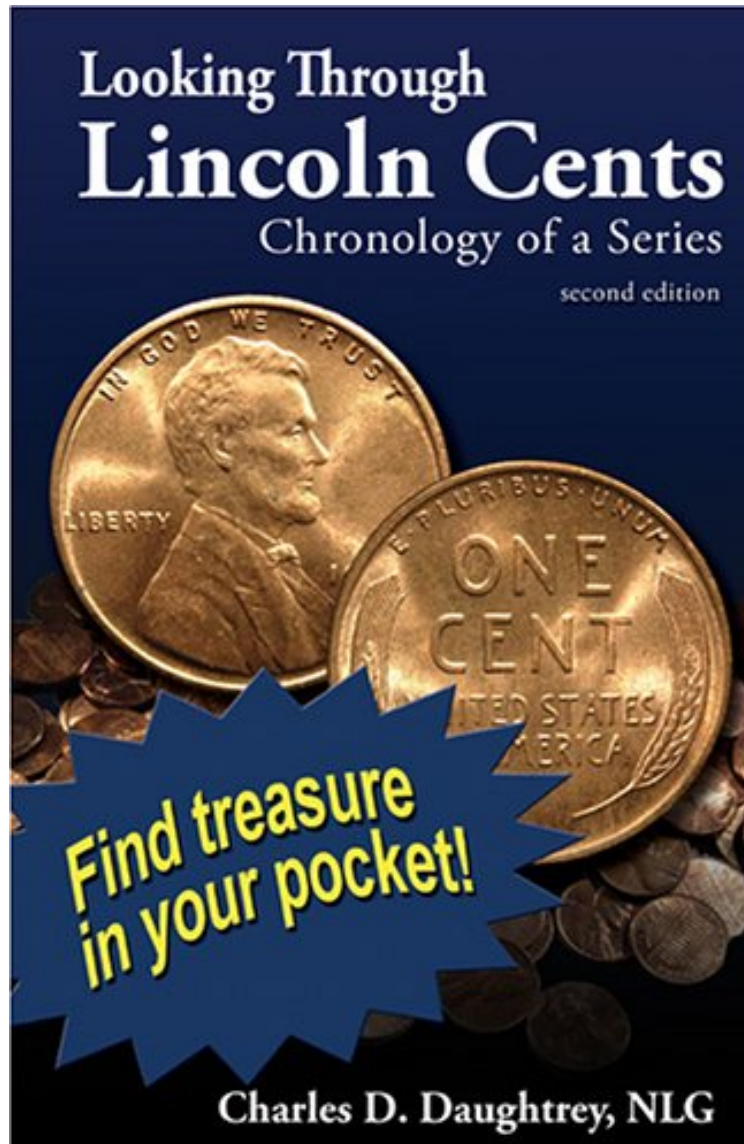

I was pleased with the amount of information relating to all aspects of the die making process, hub doubling, the different classes of doubled dies, and

other things too numerous to list. If you are considering this resource for purchase, note that it is geared primarily for the variety collector and not just something to give the history of the series. If that is your forte, give "The complete Guide to Lincoln cents" a try by David Lange. That is geared much more toward the total history of the series. "Looking through Lincoln cents" is almost 8 years old now, and Mr. Daughtrey has no current plans that I'm aware of to introduce a 3rd edition.
